## Author John Elder Robison Inspires Connections

The room was full. Students were squirming in their chairs looking around with excited energy and curiosity - ready to meet *New York Times* bestselling author and ‘Free Range Aspergian,’ John Elder Robison. Having read Robison’s memoir *Be Different* in advance of his visit to Spaulding, one teenager asked Robison about his cars and motorcycles, another about his rock band and building exploding guitars, and a third student wanted to know why Robison had dropped out of school.

Casually sitting on a table in the midst of the students, Robison answered questions and candidly spoke of his experiences growing up as an ‘odd child’ – an outsider unable to grasp social cues, viewed by teachers as a failure in school and often ostracized and bullied by his classmates. In one of many poignant moments, a girl listening intently to Robison talk about his lack of childhood friends, loneliness and isolation growing up in a time when special education supports in schools were minimal at best – raised her hand and said, “I’m your friend.”

John Robison explained how his life changed when he came to understand and to appreciate his neurological differences. His unique gifts and skills have allowed him to succeed in doing what he loves – running his own business fixing foreign cars and sharing his life experiences through writing and speaking. He advised the students to be responsible for their own behaviors and to respect and understand their own differences.

Inspired by Robison, some students chose to write memoirs about their family, life and personal challenges for Spaulding’s annual Authors Tea project.

Students in teacher Gina O’Leary’s class were asked to include the best piece of advice they have received on how to live their lives. The young writers

heartfelt words of wisdom included: “treat others the way you want to be treated; stay in school; move on from the past and you will succeed in the future; don’t give up, there’s always hope; and just be yourself.”

Robison’s public event, hosted by Spaulding, *A Conversation with John Elder Robison*, drew an audience of 200 professionals, self-advocates and family members to Concord to learn about Robison’s experiences and his insights into the challenges individuals on the autism spectrum have with transitions in life. Spaulding students attending his presentation felt both proud and special when Robison mentioned his ‘friends’ at Spaulding.

According to O’Leary, “John Robison touched students who typically don’t make those connections. He set the stage for them to feel like it was cool to write their own life stories. Our class was a judgment free zone. Students opened up and expressed themselves through personal writing, most for the first time. It was powerful.”

# Moving On - A Boy's Journey into Adulthood

When Tom\* came to Spaulding as a residential student he was 12 years old – angry and aggressive, with inappropriate behaviors at home and school.

During his time in Spaulding's academic and behavioral program, Tom learned to be successful in the classroom and an enthusiastic participant in community service and vocational projects. He became a popular student with his teachers and his peers. Tom excelled as a Special Olympics athlete on Spaulding's

*Shooting Stars* soccer and floor hockey teams.

At 15 years old, Tom was matched with a local foster family through Spaulding's ISO (Individual Service Option) Foster Care Program, while maintaining contact with his birth parents and he transitioned from

being a residential student to a day student. Through Spaulding's career development program, Tom was exposed to a variety of vocational opportunities.



Notably, the Facilities Manager at the Pines Community Center became a mentor who inspired Tom's interest in learning more about carpentry and maintenance.

Last summer, Tom graduated as a model student and a mentor to others in his class. He is a proud, happy and accomplished 19-year-old, interning at Concord Hospital – learning vocational skills while working in the hospital's Facilities' Department. Tom values his social relationships and with his strong work ethic and charismatic personality his journey into adulthood is headed in the right direction.

He recently led his foster parents on a tour of the Concord Hospital grounds proudly showing them all over campus using the shortcuts he has discovered. Tom loves his work as a 'fix it guy' – wearing a uniform and steel toe work boots – being safe, responsible, respectful and moving on.


