



Success Beyond the ABCs and 123s

Sometimes teaching a child requires a flexible and creative approach to match their unique needs. At Spaulding Youth Center, we are incorporating instructional techniques to help meet the child where their learning requires additional support to reach success.

For reading, four of our teachers completed a vigorous Orton-Gillingham Approach training during summer 2016 and have been implementing these strategies in their classrooms. Orton-Gillingham Approach is a multisensory, language-based, structured approach to reading that starts with teaching letters and sounds and builds to applying these phonetic skills to decoding words. Because of the cognitive and flexible features of this approach, students also learn the rules of the English language for reading and spelling, which help to achieve long-term reading and writing competencies.



Through the Center for Teaching/Learning of Mathematics, six teachers completed a Vertical Acceleration approach training with Professor Mahesh Sharma. This new teaching approach is based on the language of math, including the interrelationships between number and number concepts, and uses concrete objects, specifically Cuisenaire rods, as learning aids before transitioning into abstract representations. Since this approach is based on milestone concepts and procedures, it begins with a simple concept from arithmetic and takes it to the algebraic level.

Both approaches are utilized within mainstream education as well as in cases for special education and learning disabilities. At Spaulding, we often need to look at different ways of teaching because our students demonstrate behavioral difficulties that could be compounded or intensified by learning disabilities. Due to these challenges, the arriving students are significantly behind their contemporaries and require these types of creative approaches to quickly improve and begin gaining confidence and success in the classroom.

The Sky is the Limit

Our Experiential Challenges Outdoors (EChO) offers our students many challenge-by-choice adventures, including a variety of ropes course elements within the plentiful forests on campus. Over the last few years, many of these elements have become defunct due to high wind, tree age and other natural forces. We knew that our goal needed to be to raise funds to design and install a pole course that could be out in the open and less vulnerable to these natural forces.

Based on a significant donation from the Charles Foundation along with other donors, our EChO team began designing the new challenge course to meet the needs of our wide range of students. We hired a well-respected company to safely set 55' utility poles and with the use of a giant all-terrain lift and direction from professional challenge course builder and friend Dave Moore, the EChO team finished installing the first six elements: catwalk, multiswing, crazy bridge, multiline traverse, two-line bridge, and hourglass. The course was recently inspected by Project Adventure, the

leading challenge course vendor in the country, and will be open to the students over the next few weeks. These courses are not only fun for students, but more importantly teach trust and confidence building along with safety and comradery amongst peers and teachers.

But the challenge course is far from finished. Overlooking Mt. Kearsarge and bountiful wild flowers, the new structure will be gaining a 35' climbing wall very soon. Moving forward,



Spaulding Youth Center will be partnering with Project Adventure to complete the last few elements over the next two years. Finally, this newly constructed course offers significant growth opportunities for the future, including ziplines to neighboring trees or other diagonal elements. The sky is truly the limit for our new challenge course!
